7. Obituaries

In Memory of Gerard Fanning (1952-2017)

Gerard Fanning's death has taken away a poet of supreme attentiveness, graceful intricacy and bracing insight: 'the panicked wren fleeing a patch of salal / is there to remind me, that I know / the date of my birth, but don't yet know / the date of my death, and never shall' ('Character in Search of an Author'). He was the recipient of the Rooney Prize for Irish Literature and the Brendan Behan Award, and his collections include *Easter Snow* (1992), *Working for the Government* (1999) *Water and Power* (2004), and *Hombre: New and Selected Poems* (2011), published by Dedalus Press. He was a poet who wore his acute intellect and his influences lightly, Derek Mahon and Elizabeth Bishop were touchstones, but he read everyone and was a font of knowledge about writers and writing, though self-effacing almost to a fault. He was a lover of books, and of poetry, wherever he found it. I recall his joy in the poetry of the masters, Kinsella and Heaney and Mahon, and the various transports of joy and despair provided by his fervent support of the Ireland football team. Members of IASIL Japan will recall his gentle, gentlemanly presence and quiet humour at the memorable reading he gave of his poems of 'Ireland's Unsung East Coast' at the 2013 Conference at Kyoto Notre Dame University, a visit he too remembered with great fondness. He was a caring, thoughtful, and generous friend, and a poet and person of absolute integrity. He is, and will be, greatly missed.

In Memory of Yuichi Takamatsu (1929-2017)

It was with great sadness that we received the news that Yuichi Takamatsu, professor emeritus of the University of Tokyo and former president of the English Literary Society of Japan (1985-1988), had passed away on 19 August 2017. He was a highly respected and prominent scholar of English literature, writing numerous celebrated monographs on Shakespeare, the Romantic poets, and most notably on Modernist literature. His monumental collection of literary essays, *Igirisu Kindai Shihō* [modern British poetics] (2001), not only fascinated us with the author's abundant knowledge and profound insights into the poets and the works discussed, but was itself an eloquent testimony to the joy of reading literature. It was awarded the 2002 Yomiuri prize for literature.

Prof. Takamatsu was also widely acclaimed for his contributions in literary translation. Among the best known are, of course, James Joyce's *Dubliners* and *Ulysses* (with Saichi Maruya and Reiji Nagakawa), W. B. Yeats's poems, Shakespeare's *Sonnets*, Lawrence Durrell's *The Alexandria Quartet*, and the works of Thomas De Quincey and Robert Louis Stevenson (with Teiko Takamatsu). The beauty and precision of his Japanese as well as his deep understanding of the original works reminded us of the value of translation as an artistic achievement in itself.

In his classroom, as I fondly recall from some thirty years ago, the students were respectfully attentive so as never to miss a word from such a distinguished scholar. And the words were at a premium because he was never a man of many words. We enjoyed all the more the moments when his sophisticated sense of humour made us smile. Prof. Takamatsu's warm and generous personality won the hearts of all who knew him.

May his soul rest in peace, and our deepest condolences go to the bereaved family.
